SECTION A: COMPULSORY QUESTION

QUESTION ONE

The balance of payments helps business managers and government officials to analyze a country's competitive position and to forecast the direction of pressure on exchange rates. The ability of multinational companies (MNCs) and governments to move money across national boundaries is critical. MNCs and governments depend on this ability for exports, imports, payment of foreign debts, and dividend remittances.

The list below is an extract of some of the transactions compiled by the Ministry of Finance and National Planning in Zambia relating to international trade for the year 2020.

- (a) The Zambezi River Authority paid \$15 million to an Italian company to make architectural drawings for repairing the cracks in the Kariba dam wall.
- (b) Zambeef sold \$20 million worth of meat products to neighboring countries in the SADC region.
- (c) Scavenger Ltd made a takeover bid of a South African company at a price of \$200 million.
- (d) The Secretary to the Treasury received \$300 million from the International Monetary Fund on behalf of the Government of Zambia for balance of payments support.
- (e) An American company bought shares in Barloworld Zambia for \$27 million, a company listed on the Lusaka stock exchange.
- (f) Tudor Limited a Zambian subsidiary paid \$4 million in dividends to its parent company based in France.
- (g) The Secretary to the Treasury settled \$500 million as part payment of interest on the Eurobond on behalf of the Government of Zambia.
- (h) Net discrepancies and errors of \$30,000 ended up being posted as receipts on the balance of payments.
- (i) Zangena Limited borrowed \$ 5 million from a bank in the USA to be repaid within 12 months.

a) Using the information provided above:

- i. Advise the Minister of Finance and National Planning about the five (5) categories of the Balance of Payments. **(10 marks)**

- ii. **Advise** the Minister how items from (a) to (i) would be classified in the Balance of Payments, give reasons for the basis of your classification. **(10 marks)**
 - iii. **Evaluate** whether the country has a balance-of-payments deficit or surplus after you have prepared the balance of payments statement **(15 marks)**
 - iv. **Recommend** to the finance minister in detail, two types of measures Zambia can use to resolve imbalances on the balance of payments account. **(15 marks)**
